Benefits of, and process for, using MAEIA model assessments

MAEIA assessments are aligned to Michigan and national standards, and they are used by arts educators across Michigan.

There are currently more than 2,000 users registered on MAEIA's website who can download for free any of the 360 performance assessments developed by Michigan arts educators. This assessment catalogue includes performance events (on-demand performance assessments) in dance, music, theatre, and visual arts and performance tasks (project-based performance assessments) in dance, music, theatre, and visual arts, suitable for grades K-2, 3-5, 6-8, and high school.

MAEIA performance assessments are designed to be instructionally embedded.

Maximize your valuable instructional time while assessing students' knowledge and skills in creating, performing/presenting and responding in the arts. MAEIA's extensive catalogue allows you to select items that align with your instructional goals. Equally important, the assessments allow students to personalize their responses while engaged in the artistic process.

MAEIA performance assessments provide insights into student learning and educator effectiveness in three ways:

- 1. as a pre-assessment activity, to see what students know and can do
- 2. as a pre-post assessment, for educators to use during instruction in order to demonstrate their effectiveness
- 3. as a post-instruction assessment, to document what students know and are able to do following instruction.

MAEIA assessments are both flexible and useful! You can select the MAEIA assessments that already fit your planned instruction, and use the assessments when and how they will be most useful. We suggest that teachers select a manageable number of assessment events or tasks, fit these into your instructional plan for the year, and use them in the manner most suitable to you. In other words, there is no standard number of assessments to be used, no standard time when they are to be administered, and no standard use for the assessment — these decisions are all up to you.

Collaborative Scoring System

Ready to deepen your understanding and scoring of student work resulting from MAEIA assessments, and work with colleagues in doing so? The **Michigan Collaborative Scoring System**,



MI-CSS, is a MAEIA 2019-2020-featured learning opportunity that permits teams of arts educators to support one another's use and scoring of the assessments and discuss student work within a team of colleagues. Teachers in a 2018-29 pilot found this opportunity provided valuable, relevant professional learning often not available to them. Using MAEIA'S new software, MI-CSS, powered by OSCAR Classroom—field-tested in 2018-19. A number of Collaborative Scoring Teams will be formed in 2019-20 with the guidance and facilitation of experienced Team Leads. This will permit you to use MAEIA assessments with other colleagues and share in learning to use the assessments and the information that results.

School or district improvement

Want to improve your arts education program as part of building/district school improvement?

As school and district leaders prepare to review and refresh their arts education programs within school and district improvement plans, we encourage you to use MAEIA's Program Improvement process. Prepare now to tell your school's arts education story, prioritize action steps toward improvement, and integrate arts strategies into the district/school improvement plan.

The cornerstone of MAEIA's program improvement work is the <u>Michigan Arts Education Program</u> <u>Review Tool (PRT)</u>, a self-study tool that arts educators can use to analyze and reflect upon the status of their districts' and schools' arts education program and that can serve as a basis for enhancing an arts education program in the context of school improvement.

The MAEIA Program Review Tool collects and analyzes data related to seven criteria for quality arts education programs described in the Michigan Blueprint for Quality Arts Education. The PRT:

- Offers a "deep dive" to gather useful, credible arts education data for your school and/or district
- Informs overall school improvement goals and strategies with arts strategies
- Yields data for meaningful arts education conversations with colleagues, administrators, the school improvement team, and the school board
- Can help foster a district-wide commitment to arts learning

MAEIA's Program Review Tool is available now for voluntary use throughout Michigan. We welcome your feedback as you put it to use in your school or district. If you would like help in using the PRT during your school/district improvement planning, MAEIA staff would like to support you and follow your story.
